**CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

## 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. The curriculum is designed by the university and the college has to implement it. To implement the curriculum effectively semester wise annual teaching plan is prepared for each paper by the respective teacher. A teachers Diary having daily work notes including lecture time, topic taught is maintained. The attendance of students is taken daily for each subject and its record is maintained. To involve students in regular and continuous study, internal evaluation is done through periodic tests, class seminars, group discussion, surprise test, oral test, open book test and assignments. At the beginning of each course the detailed syllabus of each paper is provided to the students with the list of recommended books and reference books. Also departmental blogs are created to cater the needs of students where students can get syllabus, question papers of previous examinations, list of reference books, notices and departmental activities. The college has a well-equipped central library having a good collection of reference books for each subject. A good number of Journals and periodicals are also available. The students are motivated to make use of the library. Some departments also have departmental library so that students can easily get the required books. Question papers of previous year university examinations are made available to the students by the respective teachers, the central library and Departmental Blogs. The university organizes workshops on the revised syllabi. This gives a better idea for its implementation. Teachers are encouraged to participate in these workshops. A teacher gets clarification of any query regarding the curriculum by consulting the university through the members of the Board of Studies. The college has well-equipped laboratories and one Common Research Centre with advanced research equipments. Students are guided to work on the projects funded by UGC Basic Scientific Research Scheme. The college has language laboratory through which four basic skills viz. listening, speaking, reading and writing are strengthened. The software in the language lab is upgraded from time to time to suit the demands of the students and teachers and as per the need of hour. The college has computer laboratories for B.Sc. Computer Science students and B.Com. students to carry out their practical in the curriculum. The college provides ICT facilities including computer, projector and printer with Xerox to some of the departments. A common smart classroom is provided and is being used by all departments to enhance better understanding and effective learning/teaching. Video conferencing facility is also available to make the teaching and learning effective and joyous. It is to be noted that POs (Program Outcomes), PSOs (Program Specific Outcomes), and COs (Course Outcomes) are not designed by our university, however, our faculty with consultation of experts have developed POs, PSO and COs. POs, PSOs and COs clearly describe what a student should know, understand or be able to do at the end of the program and it is uploaded on our website.

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2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentoring is when someone with more knowledge in an area helps a less experienced person. Mentoring is a unique scheme of supporting mentee (students) to improve their learning and leadership skills, motivating them towards their future career development. The college has, therefore, introduced mentor – mentee scheme to motivate students to excel in academic and non – academic fields. The following are objectives! 1) To help troubled students cope with academic, non – academic and personal problems. 2) To identify problems of students and to bring them to the notice of the concerned authorities. 3) To help the mentee understand the challenges and opportunities present in the college and develop a smooth transition to campus life. 4) To guide slow learners and encourage the advanced learners. To pursue the above mentioned objectives, the committee for mentor – mentee scheme was established. The Principal, IQAC coordinator and the senior faculty highlighted the importance of the mentor – mentee scheme. Empathy and humility are the most essential qualities of any mentor to possess. Since most of the students are from the rural area, the mentors are informed to into their take accounts the agricultural background of the mentee. The mentor is expected to empathize with variety of situations his mentee could face and be humble enough not to impose their own opinions but to tailor advice to the mentee's needs. Mentors have the right to bring the problems to the notice of the Principal, however, it is desired that all the mentors work in harmony with the Discipline Committee and various other Committees. Besides regular interaction with the mentee, the mentors should arrange the meeting of his mentees once in a month. Mentors are expected to play their role as responsible seniors using their own discretion. Duties of mentors 1) The mentors should arrange regular meetings and record their findings in the register. 2) Any complaint or complement regarding mentee are to be brought to the notice of the principal. 3) The mentors should counsel their mentees. Each mentor is allotted 50 students and mentor should keep the record of their mentees and at the end of each term should report the same to the principal.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As Our College is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad it is obligatory to follow the rules and regulation of the university in respect of student's evaluation. As per the university guidelines, we have adopted semester system for undergraduate courses. At the end of each semester (two semesters in a year) the university conducts examinations declares the results. However, the college has taken initiatives for the continuous internal evaluation of the students. After the admission of first year students the college conducts an objective test carrying 50 marks in each subject to identify slow and advanced learners. Bearing in mind the importance of CIE, the oral tests, surprise test, open book tests are conducted. Two sessional tests, home assignments, quizzes / problems solving sessions are arranged and end semester examination in each course during each semester is conducted by the university. Attention in the class is evaluated by asking the questions at the end of the class on the topic being taught in that class. Class seminars are arranged every now and then in the smart class room. A student is allotted a topic and he /she prepares a paper with the help of teacher concerned. The time and date is fixed and the students present his paper in the class. Well in advance, the title of the paper and the name of paper presenter is informed. After the presentation of the paper, discussion takes place. The students are given freedom to ask questions and the paper presenter answers the questions. If the paper presenter fails to answer the question the teacher concerned answers the question. For PG courses the university has introduced choice based credit system from the academic year 201516. The evaluation system for Post Graduate programs adopted by Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad has two components Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) the End Semester Examination. The ratio of weightage is 20 CIE and 80 End Semester Exam which is conducted by the university. To enhance the knowledge and skills of the students, the teachers can understand the performance of their students accordance with the objectives they had set before themselves. As per the academic calendar the students' performance is evaluated before the final examination through objective tests, class seminars, group discussion, projects, home assignments, oral test, etc. First test for all subjects is conducted after completing 40 syllabus and the second test after completing 60 syllabus.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

All the stakeholders are well aware of the fact that the evaluation is an integral part of the teaching learning process. Though the weightage for C.I.E. in the university examination is not given, at the beginning of every academic year, the college prepares the academic calendar for Continuous Internal Evaluation to test students' depth of his / her knowledge, skills, application of principles of problem solving, ability to communicate and ability to face unknown situations, etc. In order to identify slow and advanced learners the test carrying 50 marks in each subject for B.A.I, B.Com.I and B.Sc.I classes is conducted every year. The following calendar is prepared for the academic year 201718. The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the Conduct of CIE

- 1) June Admission Process.
- 2) July Test for slow and advanced learners.
- 3) August Class seminar, Group discussion.
- 4) September Class test / Surprise test / Open book test / Oral test / Seminar / Group discussion / Project work / Question paper solving.
- 5) October University exam.
- 6) November Project work / Class seminar.
- 7) December Class test / Surprise test / Open book test / Oral test / Seminar / Group discussion/project work.
- 8) January Quiz / Project work / Project exhibition / Wall paper / Class Seminar.

The institution has made necessary arrangements for the maintenance and upkeep of the college infrastructure. The management provides necessary funds to be utilized for maintenance. The college management undertakes the task of maintenance and improvement of infrastructure on the campus. As per the need of the institution with regard to infrastructure, the IQAC prepares perspective Development Plan every year. The plan is placed in the meeting of College Development Committee for its final approval and accordingly it is implemented. The College Development Fund is utilized for maintenance and minor repairs of building, furniture and equipments. The College Development Committee of the college lists the activities on priority basis, gives cost estimation and submits the proposal to the management of the institution. The Management gives permission to utilize the college development fund for this purpose. The management also ensures the optimal utilization of budget allocated. The major maintenance and repairs are outsourced through external agencies through AMCs.

The college systematically undertakes annual maintenance and repair of infrastructure. The laboratory equipments and instruments are maintained by using funds from College Development Fund. Computers and Electronic devices are maintained and repaired through the funds made available from the College Development Fund. For major problems, the external services are sought on the contract or need basis for which special provisions are made in the annual

budget. The college has installed sensitive equipments like UPS Inverter Batteries, Air Conditioners, water purifiers and scientific instruments in specified places in the college. The laboratory staff keep track regarding maintenance and upkeep of scientific instruments and chemicals. Repair, replacement, regular servicing of the instruments / equipments are done under the supervision of faculty members of concerned department. Similarly the college utilizes the service of a qualified electrician for repair, service and maintenance of electrical equipments. The college has an AMC with companies and firms who have supplied RO water purifiers, computers, UPS inverter batteries, Air Conditioners for the regular checkup and maintenance of the equipments.

1. Formation of Various Committees: Ours is participative management and has specific mechanism to ensure decentralized governance system at various levels. The college has an efficient internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism that consists of Principal, Heads of the departments and other staff members. There are various committees to carry out different duties and responsibilities. The College Development Committee as per the rules and statues of the University has been formed and actively working. The college has an inbuilt mechanism to check the work efficiently of the nonteaching staff. Care is taken so that all the stakeholders should be able to take active part for the enhancement of quality of education. For the smooth functioning of the institution various committees are formed. The principal being the head of the educational institution is the chairman i.e. supreme authority. The meeting is called and with the constitution of each committee along with 34 members is appointed for planning, implementation of various academic and nonacademic committees such as Admission Committee, Student Council Committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Raging Cell, Cultural Committee, Gymkhana Committee, Purchase Committee, Library Committee etc. In each of these committees all the stakeholders are given representation. The sub committee chairman arranges meetings in which decisions are taken and finally the principal and the members of the management give the consent for implementation. After the approval, all the members/stakeholders i.e. teachers, nonteaching staff, students, alumni, parents, management work together to make the event successful and result oriented.

2. Organization of National Seminar (A Case Study): As our employees are our biggest assets and our participative management is an effective strategy that improves the quality of work for which we organize various activities such as national level seminars and conferences. During the current academic year, we organized a national level seminar in the subject of Sociology. The meeting of the departments was held to discuss the themes, the resource persons, the dates of the seminars, etc. The concerned department was given freedom to suggest various themes. The proposals to obtain grants from various agencies were prepared. The list of resource persons was short listed. The important issue of financial aspect was discussed. We have High Performance Team (HPT) of 100 students and they are also given freedom and we welcomed their ideas too. Each committee comprised of teachers, nonteaching, staff and students. Even the members of the College Development Committee (CDC) took active part in the organization of seminar. The proposal of seminar was submitted to the mother institution for its approval. Immediately after the approval from the Management, the proposal of the seminar was submitted to the university. The proposal to organize the seminar was approved by the University. All the stakeholders worked hard as if their own household function was being celebrated. The present case study clearly shows that all the stakeholders viz. students, nonteaching staff, the faculty, the alumni, the parents, the principal and the Management work together and enjoy the activity to the fullest.

Also our teachers are made to submit their lesson plan for every semester. Our senior teachers are the members of Board of Studies in their respective subjects and they play vital role in improving their subject curriculum with new perspective of changing scenario of our contemporary world.</p>

evaluation reports are prepared within the stipulated time. The reform has resulted in increasing the level of acquisition of subject knowledge.

Research and Development

The college has a Research Promotion Committee which monitors and coordinates all research activities on campus. To promote research the college has set up Common Research Centre (CRC) in the separate building. The research projects are undertaken and students are provided guidance with regard to University level Avishkar. Efforts are being made to create an ecosystem for innovation and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge. In the current academic year, 11 research papers were published in International Referred Journal.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

There are ten different buildings on the college campus. 26 classrooms are used as lecture halls. The science building has 12 rooms where mainly science laboratories are housed. The administrative building has 10 rooms where a Seminar Hall, College Office, Principal Cabin, etc. are located. The college has two hostels for girls, ICT enabled hall, Smart Classroom, Seminar Halls, Language Lab, WiFi, Internet Facility, LCD Projectors, Commerce Computer Lab, Computer Science Lab, Common Research Centre, Ladies Common Room, etc. The computerized Library has 90149 books, 137 periodicals and 31,35,000 ebooks and 6,000 ejournals. The Gymnasium Hall has five rooms.

Human Resource Management

Various committees of teaching, nonteaching faculties and take holders are formed which are effectively working under the guidance of the principal and Internal Quality Assurance Cell. These Committees periodically organize the meetings in the presence of the principal to discuss various issues and takes decisions accordingly. These meetings are well documented in the minutes. The decisions taken by the various committees are forwarded to College Development Committee and Management for the final approval and to the execution of decision, which ascertains the efficiency of working of every minute.
