<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

- The college is run by Shri Swami Vivekanand Shikshan Sanstha, Kolhapur which is established by a great visionary teacher Dr. Bapuji Salunkhe with the Motto "Education for Knowledge, Science and Culture." The Sanstha is one of the leading educational institutes in Maharashtra. It has been successfully running 406 education units including 23 Senior College, 66 Junior College, 03 B.Ed. Colleges, 01 Law College, 01 Engineering, 01 Pharmacy college in 13 districts of Maharashtra and Karnataka.
- Ramkrishna Paramhans Mahavidyalay Osmanabad established in **1959** is striving hard to impart quality education especially for rural, semi-urban, socio-economically downtrodden community.
- It is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad (Maharashtra).
- The college is in one of the **aspirational and Focused districts** which are identified by **NITI Aayog** as under-developed and having a poor socio-economic growth. It is taking unending efforts for the welfare of socially and economically weak background and down-trodden communities. 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The IQAC ensures effective curriculum delivery through Planning, implementation and monitoring with a documented process keeping student-centric approach.

IQAC Plan:

Academic Flexibility

D. programmes**. **NEP is implemented for PG courses from the academic year 2023-2024**. CBCS pattern is implemented by the affiliating university, for UG and PG programme offered by the college.
- Principal and faculties are elected on University's Management Council, Senate, Chairman and members of University BoS.
- All departments have formed an **Ad-hoc BoS** in the subject to design syllabus of short-term skill based **certificate courses.** These courses are being conducted by each department as per the need of the students.

Curriculum enrichment

- Crosscutting issues related to IKS, Gender, Human Values, Environment, Professional Ethics are effectively imparted among students.
- More than 50% students complete project work.

- College library is fully automated with an Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) known as **SLIM21** Software. There are **17** computers in the library with optical fiber cable line, LAN and power backup facilities and CCTV System etc.

- The user community at the College has access to more than 6500+ E-journals, 96000+ E-Books and 5 Databases.

categories and **60**+ languages.

Expenditure on Infrastructure

- Birth anniversary of Srinivasa Ramanujan is celebrated as **National Mathematics Day** at which Students seminars and guest lecture are arranged.

Establishment of IPR cell, Awareness about IPR:

- The college has established the IPR Cell to create awareness of IPR among students and teachers.
- The college has organized workshops/webinars to create awareness of Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) including requisite guidance and procedures of copyrights, patents, trademarks and publicity rights search and application filing.

- Parent Institute helps us to mobilize fund to develop infrastructure in the campus.
- IQAC and UGC committees always search new resources for mobilizing funds and it has

developed systematic procedures for optimal utilization.

- Donations given to the college is exempted under 80G, as per income tax act, which is one more effective strategy to mobilize funds.
- Members of CDC, teaching and administrative staff, existing and alumni students contribute to mobilize resources.
- All stakeholders actively appeal community, philanthropists, industrialists and donors for donations.
- As per priority and advice of CDC, funds are utilized for infrastructural development and beautification of campus, ICT devices and upgradation, student development and necessary equipment.
- Fund received is spent and utilized through proper channel, such as quotations and discussion with purchase committee.

- The college has developed necessary infrastructure by obtaining and utilizing the grants from the UGC (CPE status in Phase I and II), DBT Star College Scheme, etc.
- It has cordial relations with society by arranging various campaigns, rallies, celebration of days, surveys, camps, village-adoption, awareness programmes etc.
- Activities are carried out to address social issues of concern and sensitizing about scientific temper, eradication of social ills, environmental awareness and relief measures for needy people bearing social commitment and accountability.
- Besides regular programmes **79** skill based certificate courses are conducted during last five years. More than **50%** students participated in these certificate courses.
- Students undertake project work in socially important issues, more than **50%** students done project work.
- *Shivar* (Agro) Chemistry activity is conducted in which students visits and interacts with nearby farmers. Vivekanand Soil Testing facility center is established.
- The college has registered Alumni association. Alumni contributed financially, donated useful materials, actively participated in various pragrammes.
- Financial support to students more than 70% with government and institutional scholarships. Percentage of students Placement and Progression is more than 50%.
- Implemented E-governance, conducted Green, Energy audits, Gender Audit and Academic and Administrative Audit, use of ICT in teaching-learning, enhancement of IT facilities has been done.
- Well-maintained **7 acres** campus with greenery, use of **renewable energy**, water conservation, effective management of waste materials are the initiatives for environment conservation.

Future Plans:

- To submit proposal for **DBT Star College Status** grant.
- Effective implementation of **NEP** to all UG programmes.
- Introduction of 4 year UG programme.
- More imphasis on IKS.
- Construct modern, spacious, well-equipped and state of the art new Auditorium.
